In this guide, you will find some helpful tips to have your student ready for a successful year at HGP!

Following Directions

- Practice tasks with two- and threestep directions.
- Example: "Put on your clothes, brush your teeth and comb your hair."

Fine Motor Skills

- Expose your student to many writing tools such as crayons, markers, pencils, etc.
- Let your student practice writing their name with an uppercase for the first letter with lowercase letters for the remaining letters.
- Play with Playdoh
- Use child safe scissors for cutting practice
- Play with small toys such as Legos

Shapes and Colors

- Help your student recognize shapes-circle, triangle, square, rectangle, and hexagon
- Help your student recognize the 8 primary colors-red, orange, yellow, blue, green, purple, brown and black

Number Recognition and Counting

- Look for opportunities to verbally count throughout the day.
- Show your student numbers you see in the environment and have your student identify the number.

Letter Recognition and Sounds

- Play games to help with letter recognition-magnet letters, Go Fish and Memory with letters, etc.
- All letters "say" a sound. Look for items around the house that begin with the same sound or ask your student to say the beginning sound for an item

Reading Readiness READ, READ, READ to your student!

- Run your finger under the words to show words go from left to right and top to bottom.
- Talk about the stories you read with your student.
- Playing rhyming word games with your student.

Encouraging Independence

- Strive to begin to practice established rules and routines everyday.
- Teach independence in the bathroom, with clothing and tying shoes.
- Students should be able to open food items they bring to school with them independently.
- Teach simple problem solving skills and begin recognize other's feelings.

Social Skills

- Practice asking questions and have your child respond with an answer to express their thoughts, feelings and needs.
- Give your student opportunities to interact with other children in a social setting.
- Teach simple problem solving skills and begin to recognize other's feelings.
